March Workshop. Tapestry Weaving: Michael (& Mary) Crompton (by Janet Major)



'Tapestry is all about communication – telling a story in textiles'

The design process Michael provided us with some insight into his design process, selecting the right yarns, weaving rhythmically, working ideas in watercolours – between 15 & 20 paintings might be produced for one tapestry. No straight lines appear in Michael's tapestry. Tell a story in the tapestry. Linking the environment in the tapestry – eg an oak tree in the shape of an oak leaf. When the colours for the tapestry are being 'worked out' do some windings around a column of card – useful to have the final colours hanging from the edge of the frame (if a floor frame) or grouped together so that the colours can be seen next to each other as the final choices are made in weaving the tapestry

Working the tapestry Warp threads (Michael uses 6 threads per inch (but 4-8 can be used) - cotton, linen, polypropylene (Michael uses wool, 3 stranded with a high twist) light colour is best. A continuous warp thread as this gives a better tension. No extra threads are worked on the selvages, but these are very visible and need to be checked continuously for the tension and also to see that they remain vertical (not pulling in)

Hints: If the warp threads sound like a harp then the threads are too tight. A spacing cord, twisted across the yarns at the top and the bottom (& tied to the sides of the frame) helps to keep the warp in the correct place.

Transferring the design: Trace onto tracing paper. Put this between the back and the front threads. On the BACK put a small dot of permanent marker pen to outline the design. Then turn each thread and mark the spot all the way round.

Weaving Michael weaves from the back, he uses a bobbin with a round end held in the palm of the hand with the point extending beyond the fingers. 2 colours are used at once. Leave about 2 inches of thread hanging at the back when changing colours. These are left hanging and not fastened in. If the tapestry is to hang unframed then these will stop condensation forming between the tapestry and the wall. An outlined section is worked at a time. Take the weft thread from the right to the left an arch is formed so that when the weft is beaten down this does not pull in and the tension is maintained. Always start from the same point, by overlapping the same warp thread. Drag the point of the bobbin from left to right after the beating down to give a slight texture to the final tapestry.

Hints: Do a bottom border of about an inch, you can put details here (upside down!) eg. initials, date, code etc Put a shed in, once the design dots have been transferred to the warp

Finishing the tapestry Remove from frame. Turn in the top and bottom of the tapestry. Velcro along the top edge and then glue the other half of this onto a strip of wood with araldite.

Note an experienced weaver like Michael takes about 10 hours to weave a square yard (and this does not take into account the design process)

And those of you who love the intersection of math and weaving will particularly enjoy the mathematical problems addressed in the article—how to handle in the enormous files (on 200 CDs!) that resulted from the effort to create high-resolution digital photos of the tapestries, especially the backs of the tapestries, before they were covered with new backing material.
